The Baltimore City Office of Civil Rights Scholarship is open to Baltimore City Public School (including Charter school) students who exemplify community involvement, leadership, and passion for civil rights. There will be one award in each category.

(1)\$250- The Walter P. Carter Award will be given to a 5th grade student who attends a Baltimore City Public School that exemplifies community engagement, leadership, and a passion for civil rights.

(2)\$500- The Dr. Lenwood Ivey Award will be given to a High School Student of Baltimore City Public Schools who exemplifies community engagement, leadership, and a passion for civil rights.

**Recipients of the award will receive a ticket for themselves and a parent/guardian/school administrator to the Annual Civil Rights Breakfast, where they will read a portion of their essay.**

**The deadline for all submissions is Monday, September 11, 2017 at 5pm. Applications must include all requested information at the time of submission and must be emailed to [civilrights@baltimorecity.gov](mailto:civilrights@baltimorecity.gov) to be considered.**

**Late submissions will not be accepted.**
